Inspiration

In the 1960's and 1970's is was normal, or at least not unusual for young people to need to "find themselves." Why? How do you find yourself? I mean how can you lose yourself? It's you. You're you. Obviously it was more about who they were. They needed to find their identity. By knowing their identity it was easier to figure out where they were going. Many of these people found themselves by backpacking across Europe, or getting back to nature or unfortunately some by taking drugs to "find a higher plane."

There is something important about knowing where you come from, who you are and where you are going. Why? Because the answers to these questions give us value and direction.

What does the Bible say about where you and I came from? Palm 139:13-16 says, "For you created my inmost being; you knit me together in my mother's womb. I praise you because I am fearfully and wonderfully made; your works are wonderful, I know that full well. My frame was not hidden from you when I was made in the secret place, when I was woven together in the depths of the earth. Your eyes saw my unformed body; all the days ordained for me were written in your book before one of them came to be." Genesis chapters 1-2 tell us God created the world and placed people in it. It's pretty clear. We didn't evolve from primordial slime. We were created, that's where we came from

Who are you? You were created in God's image (Genesis 1:26, 27) The Apostle Luke (Luke 3:23-38) follows the genealogy of Jesus all the way back to Adam who was "the Son of God." You are God's child.

Where are you going? John 14:2-3 promises, "My Father's house has many rooms; if that were not so, would I have told you that I am going there to prepare a place for you? And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come back and take you to be with me that you also

may be where I am." Where is Jesus now? He answered that question Himself in Luke 22:69, "But from now on, the Son of Man will be seated at the right hand of the mighty God." Much of Isaiah and Revelation discuss and describe heaven and the new earth. So if you choose to, you're going to a perfect paradise, heaven, to live with the One who loves you most, Jesus.

This is all very nice, but what does that mean for you and me to-day? How does it make a difference to know God created you. To know you are God's child. And to know you're heading for heaven? The answers to these questions made a difference for Jesus. John 13:3 says, "Jesus knew that the Father had put all things under his power, and that he had come from God and was returning to God..." This verse answers where Jesus came from, who He was and where He was going.

Jesus knew He was the Son of God. He knew where He came from: from God the Father and heaven. And He knew were He was going: back to the Father, back to heaven. This identity and purpose made John 13:4-5 possible. "...So he got up from the meal, took off his outer clothing, and wrapped a towel around his




waist. After that, he poured water into a basin and began to wash his disciples' feet, drying them with the towel that was wrapped around him."

Because Jesus knew where He came from, who He was, and where He was headed He was able to serve His disciples and ultimately the world in the most profound way. He gave His divine life so we can have the same future He looked forward to, heaven. His service, ultimate service, on the cross allows us to more fully know where we came from, who we are and where we are going. For what purpose? Jesus says in John 13:15, "I have set you an example that you should do as I have done for you." Meaning we know our identity which allows us to humbly serve others as He served others. No job, no task, no other person can diminish where we came from, we were created by God, to be His children and to live forever in perfect peace and harmony with Jesus forever. It makes all our service holy and no task, no matter how humble can diminish who we are in Christ Jesus our Lord. With God you are never lost and you always have a purpose. So, go and do...

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My Father's Amazing World - Venom Part 1

Perhaps we keep them simply because there are so many we can't kill them off. If so, good! Without bees our world would be vastly different. Our world would be a hungry one. Without bees to pollinate our food there would be very little food left. Every fruit you have ever eaten had to be pollinated. Wikipedia says, "The value of these pollination services is commonly measured in the billions of dollars. Bees collect 66 pounds of pollen per year, per hive." We take the work of bees for granted most of the time, but there is a community in China that doesn't. "The most dramatic example comes from the apple and pear orchards of south west China, where wild bees have been eradicated by excessive pesticide use and a lack of natural habitat. In recent years, farmers have been forced to hand-pollinate their trees, carrying pots of pollen and paintbrushes with which to individually pollinate every flower, and using their children to climb up to the highest blossoms. This is clearly just possible for this high-value crop, but there are not

enough humans in the world to pollinate all of our crops by hand." from www.chinadialogue.net. There are steps being taken to try to keep this problem from developing in other locations.

Pesticides may be the cause of CCD (colony collapse disorder). CCD is when a whole bee colony or hive dies over night. In 2007 30-70% of domestic hives in North America died due to this disorder. Farmers and scientist alike are working hard to determine the causes of CCD.

But don't despair the Bible promises, "As long as the earth endures, seedtime and harvest, cold and heat, summer and winter, day and night will never cease." Genesis 8:22 (NIV) "They (righteous) are the ones who will dwell on the heights, whose refuge will be the mountain fortress. Their bread will be supplied, and water will not fail them. Your eyes will see the king in his beauty and view a land that stretches afar." Isaiah 33:16-17 (NIV) In the mean time, plant some flowers, leave the pesticides alone and don't bother those busy little bees.
